


# 2024 Impact Report
















**TOTAL ADOPTIONS IN 2024: 2,115**

### 2024 von Arx Adoption Center Results









# Foster Volunteers

### Offering shelter, love, and safety to those who need it most

In 2024 we had a staggering total of 1,536 animals lovingly cared for in our foster homes; 1,182 cats, 342 dogs, 8 rabbits, and 4 small furries all spent time in foster homes. When our shelter is full, which it almost always is, the only way we can save more animals is by asking our foster families to step up for us — and they always do!



Julia came to us at just one day old with her mom and littermates. Her mom was very ill and could not produce milk or take care of the babies. They were quickly placed with a bottle baby foster. Julia's littermates were thriving but she was not, until she was placed with a foster family experienced with fragile kittens. She was a fighter and everyday she continued to improve despite her eye infections and ringworm. After 12 weeks, she was finally healthy enough to find a loving home and was quickly adopted. She is a living example of how successful our foster program is with neonate kittens!



Muffin Man was pulled from Clewiston Animal Shelter in October of 2022 as a heartworm positive senior with cataracts and arthritis. He was placed in a foster home initially for medical treatment. He was treated for his heartworm disease and his health improved. Muffin Man was made available for adoption, but due to his age and medical issues there was very little interest in him. He was eventually placed in a hospice foster home in July 2024 until he passed peacefully. Thanks to our incredible medical team and an amazing foster family, Muffin Man was able to spend the last two years of his life comfortable, spoiled, and completely loved in a happy home.



Chief has faced many stress-related medical and behavioral challenges at our shelter, making it difficult to find him an adopter or place him in a foster home. Our medical and behavior teams worked tirelessly to help him. He eventually found an amazing foster home where he was given a much needed break from the shelter environment. Without fosters that give our more challenging dogs a second chance, we would not be able to help dogs like Chief find a permanent home.



Lulu came to us in August of 2024 as a neonate kitten with an upper respiratory infection and was quickly placed in a foster home. Her illness was very persistent and required medical intervention and extra care from her foster family. They are truly committed to her and are optimistic in finding her a loving home. Without her foster family and the PBHSN medical team, Lulu would not be the beautiful and happy kitten she is today.

### Rescue Recess

# Take a nice walk with a shelter dog and treat yourself to a tail-wagging time

Rescue Recess is a very simple program that lets you take a shelter dog out for a couple of hours for some mental and physical exercise. It's so incredibly beneficial for our dogs to get out of the shelter and burn off some energy, even for just an hour or two. And they just may be seen out in the community by a potential adopter! In 2024 we had more than 600 Rescue Recess sessions!

We have many great Rescue Recess volunteers, but a few stand out as true heroes of the program. Michaela and Marian Penzes are regular Rescue Recess volunteers, taking dogs out on a weekly basis for the past year. The list of dogs they have taken out is long; more than 15 dogs have enjoyed a walk at Baker Park, Naples Botanical Garden, Paradise Coast Sports Complex, and other parks in the area. Sometimes they take the dogs home to enjoy a dip in their pool, or to Starbucks for a puppuccino. They let the dogs dictate how and where the recess takes them. Asked if they have any favorites, they replied: "... all of them touched our hearts and gave us lots of memories. Some we remember very fondly like Pebbles, Winston, Al, and Choco, or more recently Charlie, Coco Melon, and Captain. There are too many to name them all!"

Angela Wilson, owner of Lux Boutique in Naples, is another Rescue Recess hero. She visits the shelter every week to take one of our pups out for a walk. Angela's list of Rescue Recess dogs is also a long one, including a few who have since been adopted into happy new homes. Angela says: "Some people love dogs, but they may not be in a position to have one,

whether it's because of their housing situation, work, or travel circumstances. Rescue Recess is a great way to fill that void. You get to hang out with a dog, get your steps in, and the dogs get out of the shelter for a nice break."

Rescue Recess is a win-win-program for both our two-legged and four-legged friends!






### My Dog's Mobile Gym

# It's great exercise, reduces shelter stress, and most importantly, they love it!

In May of 2024 Susan Yawney, one of PBHSN's longtime supporters, called Sarah Baeckler to make an incredible offer. Susan and Ed Yawney wanted to sponsor a unique exercise program for our shelter dogs called My Dog's Mobile Gym. It's a traveling canine fitness program consisting of two non-motorized treadmills that move only when the dogs walk or run on them. Sarah quickly accepted the offer, and beginning in June the My Dog's Mobile Gym bus has visited all three PBHSN locations several times each month to "run" our dogs. They absolutely love it! It's great exercise and incredibly stimulating for them. You can see them smiling as they jog away, often barking as if to say: "Watch me, I got this!"

















































































### **Community Services**

### Keeping families and pets happy, healthy, and together

We provide critical services to pet owners across Collier County so they never have to face the heartbreaking decision to surrender a loved pet because they cannot afford to care for them. It's better for everyone, and in the end, less costly to provide these services to keep pets with their families rather than having to shelter and re-home them.



### Compassionate Care

Imagine being faced with the heart-wrenching decision to surrender or euthanize your pet because you cannot afford to pay for a sudden medical intervention or surgery. Our Compassionate Care Fund ensures that animals receive the necessary treatments or surgeries they need, and the families pay only what they can afford. In 2024, we provided Compassionate Care Fund assistance to 39 families and 58 animals.



#### **Operation Rescue**

Families or individuals dealing with an emergency crisis like homelessness, domestic violence, sudden hospitalization, or natural disasters can count on our Operation Rescue program to care for their pets on a temporary basis while they deal with the crisis, instead of having to endure the heartbreak of surrendering their pets. This program is funded by a number of caring donors, led by Paul and Sheila Demkovich. The numbers of families and animals served by this program since it began in 2017 is growing steadily each year.

### **Denny Plesea** Pet Food Pantry

Many families struggle financially to feed their pets, especially with the cost of pet food rising considerably over the past few years. Our Denny Plesea Pet Food Pantry answers the call by providing pet food, litter, and other basic pet supplies for families in need. In 2024 we provided food and supplies to almost 1,500 families. We accept any unopened dry or canned pet food.

It's a sad fact that there are far more dogs and cats than there are loving homes for them. Patty Baker Humane Society Naples is committed to preventing overpopulation by making pet sterilization affordable for families in need. Our affordable Spay/Neuter Assistance Program (SNAP) helps prevent unwanted litters by providing spay or neuter surgeries for pets in need. In 2024 alone we performed 171 SNAP surgeries for 110 families.

### **Behavior Training**

At PBHSN we believe that our investment in behavior training can significantly increase the adoption rates of animals by improving their social skills, mitigating behavioral issues, and making them more appealing to potential adopters, ultimately leading to a better quality of life for the animals and reducing the likelihood of them being returned to us after adoption. Every animal deserves a chance to learn how to be a good pet in a happy home. Our behavior team can help make it happen for them, even in the most challenging cases. Here are just a few of our success stories from 2024.




Copper was surrendered to PBHSN in 2022 due to a behavior history. His previous owners tried various training methods without success to control his leash reactivity. The PBHSN behavior team worked with him on his dog reactivity, muzzle training, and resource guarding protocols. It took time and patience, but he showed a steady improvement in his behavior. Copper met his perfect match in early 2024. He is doing great in his new home. His new family says "I thought you would like to know that Copper is doing amazing. He continues his training, learning to love more and more every day. We are so happy to have him as a part of our family!"



Brayden originally came to PBHSN in 2021 from a rescue on the east coast of Florida. He became a long stay dog with us, so to maximize his chances of being adopted he was transferred to a partner shelter. They reached out to us saying that Brayden had regressed while under their care, so we took him back in 2023. The behavior team worked hard to find dog friends for him and continue to expand his world. These efforts were ultimately successful. Brayden was able to co-house with other dogs and then found his perfect home in February 2024!

Ryuu and Lavender were transferred to PBHSN from another shelter. They told us that they did not meet their adoption criteria due to their inconsistent behavior. Both dogs were suffering from kennel anxiety and displayed barrier reactivity, a common reaction to spending too much time in a shelter environment. Our behavior team used stress free handling techniques to safely move both Ryuu and Lavender around the shelter. Despite being described as unadoptable from the transferring shelter, Ryuu and Lavender both found great homes in late 2024 after just relatively short stays at PBHSN.

### **Medical Services**

PBHSN's Yawney Family Veterinary Clinic serves the public, while our shelter clinic provides comprehensive care for our shelter residents

We have two full-service veterinary clinics at PBHSN caring for animals from the community and our shelter residents. Both clinics offer comprehensive medical care, preventatives, vaccines and testing for rabies, Bordetella, heartworm and other medical conditions, dental procedures, spay/neuter, and many other surgeries. 2024 was a very busy year for our clinics, as the numbers illustrate:

### Patty and Jay Baker **Mobile Veterinary** Clinic (MVC)

### Partnering With Shelters Across Southwest Florida — and Right Here at Home

#### A note from Sarah Baeckler, Chief Executive Officer

For the last few years we've had the incredible opportunity to work with several rural shelters in the area, taking PBHSN's high quality of care to areas that desperately need it. Some of these places are literally shacks, sometimes with only one or two staff, always without a veterinarian, and lacking the resources we are so fortunate to have here in Naples. We developed partnerships that will certainly go on in the long term as a result and we are still pulling animals from these shelters weekly. But more recently, and for the next few years, we have been and will continue to be needed much closer to home.

In 2024 we intentionally expanded our partnership with Collier County's Domestic Animal Services (DAS). They've undergone some changes and transitions and needed our support, so of course, we stepped up and answered the call. We lent them our Chief Operating Officer for a few months to help hold things together while they undertook a new leadership search.

In the year ahead, we expect to significantly increase our support of DAS by continuing to transfer dogs and cats from DAS to PBHSN, especially those with medical challenges. I also expect we will be providing considerable support for their veterinary services, again lending PBHSN's signature high quality standard of care to all the county's animals. Combined with the other wonderful animal agencies in our community, we are committed to making sure that Collier County's animals are our number one priority.

On the national level, taking a peek at 2024 animal shelter data shows some good news for the year ahead, but also some challenges. Fewer cats are dying in shelters nationwide than ever before, and we are proud to be a partner in that trend by pulling cats from shelters where they most likely would have been euthanized. More animals overall are being adopted from shelters across the country, which is also excellent news. Our data matches that – we had more adoptions in 2024 for both cats and dogs compared to 2023.

Unfortunately, the challenge is that despite our incredible efforts, more dogs are dying in shelters across the country than in previous years, which only reaffirms PBHSN's dedication and commitment to doing our part in rescuing the dogs most likely to die in other shelters. That's generally the big dogs, sick dogs, and dogs with a behavior history. As PBHSN continues to grow and thrive, finding solutions for these challenging dogs will continue to be a priority. No other shelter in our region does the kind of rehabilitation work with dogs that we do, and we believe it is imperative to continue that lifesaving work.

Of course, we don't want to leave out the kitties who still need us more than ever, especially with our ever-elongated kitten season, which seems to last most of the year. During this time of year we see hundreds of tiny babies needing intense care, and our survival rate for these babies is far above industry standards.

I'm truly excited about the future of Patty Baker Humane Society Naples. Expanding our local partnership with DAS will lead to better outcomes for thousands of animals in need across Collier County. Working together, we can save more lives. That's what we do best.
